

### **Funding Overview**



- Total Funding: \$1.2
   trillion for
   transportation and
   infrastructure
   spending
  - \$550 billion goes towards "new" investments and programs
  - Department of Transportation will receive \$567.5 billion (reauthorization of surface transportation programs)

# Key Themes: Equity & Sustainability

- High-speed internet access for all
- Investment in addressing legacy pollution
- Transportation funding focused on climate change mitigation, resilience, equity, and safety for all users
- Investment in public transportation to increase access and reduce GHG emissions
- Climate resiliency
- Access and resources for rural and disadvantaged communities
- Focus on these themes to increase funding eligibility
- Grant programs and audits will include sustainability metrics

### Justice40

#### Goal:

 40% "of the overall benefits of certain Federal investments flow to disadvantaged communities that are marginalized, underserved, and overburdened by pollution"

#### Invests within the Justice40 Initiative:

- Climate change
- Clean energy and energy efficiency
- Clean transit
- Affordable and sustainable housing
- Training and workforce development
- Remediation and reduction of legacy pollution
- Development of critical clean water and waste water infrastructure

#### Interim Implementation Guidance for Federal agencies:

- Initial recommendations
- Actions required of agencies that manage Justice40 programs

#### The Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool (CEJST):

 Mapping tool for identifying disadvantaged communities that are marginalized, underserved, and overburdened by pollution



## Build America, Buy America (BABA) Act


- History of domestic preference
- "...iron, steel, manufactured products, and construction materials used..."
- Initial <u>implementation guidance</u> released in April
- Agencies may grant waivers:
  - Preference would be inconsistent with public interest
  - Types of materials not produced in sufficient, reasonably available quantities
  - Inclusion of such materials will increase project costs more than 25%
- IIJA also codified Made in America Office (MIAO)



#### In the Middle of BABA Waivers: EPA

- Opposition to proposed waivers:
  - The proposed waiver only exempts projects that meet narrowly defined parameters prior to the effective date of the law, Saturday, May 14, 2022, and
  - offers no adjustment period for development and implementation of the new guidance for procurement of construction materials and manufactured products
- Proposed Solution: issue a temporary public interest waiver of domestic preference procurement requirements for construction materials and manufactured goods for SRF borrowers who "initiated design planning" for water infrastructure projects:
  - prior to the effective date of the law,
  - during the period of time between the effective date of the law until such a time as EPA issues comprehensive implementation guidance, and
  - for at least six months after the EPA issues final comprehensive implementation guidance that clearly defines the rules of compliance.


#### Formula Grants

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Rural Playbook: A roadmap for delivering opportunity and investments in rural America

Last Updated - April 2022

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will invest billions of dollars in rural communities across the country. Supporting Americans living in rural areas remains a top priority for the Biden Administration, and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law delivers on the President's promises to work toward delivering affordable, high-speed internet, safe roads and bridges, modern wastewater systems, clean drinking water, reliable and affordable electricity, and good paying jobs in every rural community. In an effort to deliver on these promises, the Biden Administration is committed to improving transparency into the availability of federal infrastructure resources to support rural communities' ability to access these critical funds.

This playbook is intended to help rural communities understand the available funding for infrastructure provided by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and other sources – offering information on the "what, where, and how" to apply for federal infrastructure dollars. Specifically, this playbook:

(1) Identifies programs and sources of funds set aside for rural communities under the law. Over 60 percent of the funding in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will be distributed via formulas to states and other recipients – while a subset of the remaining funds are available directly to communities via discretionary grants. A number of programs have specific portions of formula funds or competitive grants that are reserved for rural and disadvantaged communities, which the federal government either provides directly to communities or to intermediaries, like states, to distribute funding. The below list provides an overview of the key programs most relevant to rural communities with links to their application pages or department websites. Where able or applicable, the list also notes when funding opportunities will either become available or are already available.



#### Current NOFOs


## Bridge Investment Program (BIP)

- Approximately \$2.4 billion is now available for FY 2022.
- Competitive and discretionary grant program focusing on existing bridges
  - Reduce the overall number of bridges in poor condition, or
  - Bridges in fair condition at risk of falling into poor condition
- Entities eligible to apply:
  - Metropolitan Planning Organizations
  - Local Governments
  - Federal Land Agencies
  - Tribes
- Application due dates:
  - Planning Grant Applications are due by 11:59 PM EDT July 25, 2022
  - Land Bridge Project Grant Applications are due by 11:59
     PM EDT August 9, 2022
  - Bridge Project Grant Applications are due by 11:59 PM EDT September 8, 2022



### Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program

- Approximately \$195 million currently available, \$50 million toward planning grants and \$145 million to capital construction grant funds
- Pilot program restore community connectivity
- Removing, retrofitting, or mitigating highways or other transportation facilities that create barriers to community connectivity, including to mobility, access, or economic deployment.
- Entities eligible to apply:
  - States
  - Local governments
  - Metropolitan Planning Organizations
  - Tribes
  - Nonprofit organizations
  - Others




Applications are due at 11:59 PM EDT on October 13, 2022.

# Broadband, Equity, Access, and Development (BEAD) Program

- Approximately \$42.45 billion available
- Program goal is to get all Americans online by funding partnerships between states or territories, communities, and stakeholders, to build infrastructure where we need it to and increase adoption of high-speed internet
- Entities eligible to apply for this program include:
  - All 50 states
  - The District of Columbia and Puerto Rico
  - Other Territories: U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

Applications are due at 11:59 PM EDT on July 18, 2022



### Digital Equity Act



- \$2.75 billion available
- Three programs to promote digital inclusion and advance equity for all
- Applications are due at11:59 PM EDT on July 12

#### State Planning:

- \$60 million formula funding to develop digital equity plans
- State Capacity:
  - \$1.44 billion formula funding program to **implement** plans & promote digital inclusion
- Competitive:
  - \$1.25 billion to implement digital equity and inclusion activities
  - Eligible applicants include (but not limited to) state governments and any political subdivisions of a state, local education agencies


### Middle Mile Grants Program

- \$1B available
- Expand middle mile infrastructure, reduce costs for unserved/underserved
- Entities eligible include but not limited to:
  - Government entities (states, counties, cities, townships, tribal governments)
  - Utilities
  - Companies

Applications are due at 11:59

PM EDT on September 30,

2022



### Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)

Applications are due at 11:59 PM EST on September 15, 2022

#### **Funding**

\$5 billion in competitive grants to support local initiatives to prevent death and serious injury on roads and streets, commonly referred to as "Vision Zero" or "Toward Zero Deaths" initiatives.

#### **Eligible Projects**

An eligible project includes projects to:

- develop a comprehensive safety action plan
- conduct planning, design, and development activities for projects and strategies identified in a comprehensive safety action plan
- carry out projects and strategies identified in a comprehensive safety action plan

#### **Eligible Recipients**

Eligible recipients include metropolitan planning organizations, political subdivisions of a state, federally recognized tribal governments, or a multijurisdictional group of entities described here.

### Cybersecurity

# **State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program**

- Funding Amount: \$1,000,000,000
- For state, local and tribal governments to address cybersecurity risks, threats to info systems
- Eligible uses include cybersecurity plan development, implementation, addressing imminent threats

Applications likely to open during the third quarter of 2022



# FY22 Coastal Habitat Restoration and Resilience Grants for Underserved Communities

- Funding: ~ \$10M in FY22
  - Anticipated funding awards: \$250,000-\$500,000 over 3 years
- Objective:
  - "Invest in building organizational capacity and supporting restoration activities that benefit underserved communities and enhance their resilience to climate hazards"
- Eligible Applicants includes:
  - State, local, and tribal governments that can demonstrate status as an underserved community, or that partner with underserved communities or tribal or tribal entities, in coastal areas
- Deadline: September 30, 2022



#### FY22 Transformational Habitat Restoration and Coastal Resilience Grants

- Funding: Up to \$85M in FY22
  - Anticipated award amounts: \$3M-\$8M over 3 years
- Objective:
  - "Support transformational projects that restore marine, estuarine, coastal, or Great Lakes ecosystems, using approaches that enhance community and ecosystem resilience to climate hazards"
- Eligible Applicants Include:
  - State, local, and Native American tribal Governments
- Deadline: September 6, 2022



#### Marine Debris Removal

\$28 million available

 Funding to investigate and prevent the adverse impacts of marine debris

- Eligible entities include:
  - States
  - Counties
  - Cities
  - Townships
  - Special Districts
  - Tribes
  - Other Organizations
- Applications are due by September
   30, 2022



## Some Water Program Changes


- Section 50108 Needs Assessment for Nationwide Rural and Urban Low-Income Community:
  - EPA Administrator to prepare and submit to Congress a comprehensive report
  - Municipalities, communities, and Tribes with a disproportionate number of people who spend a disproportionate amount of household income on access to public drinking water or wastewater services or who have unsustainable levels of water-related debt
- Section 50202 Wastewater Efficiency Grant Pilot Program:
  - EPA to establish a wastewater efficiency grant pilot program
  - Projects that *create or improve waste-to-energy systems*
  - Authorizes \$20M annually FY22-FY26

- Section 50205 Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program:
  - Amends the Federal Water Pollution Control Act
  - EPA Administrator to establish a clean water infrastructure resilience and sustainability program providing
  - rants for the purpose of increasing the resilience of publicly owned treatment works...
  - Authorizes \$25M annually FY22-FY26
- Section 50207 Small Publicly Owned Treatment
  Works Efficiency Grant Program:
  - Amends the Clean Water Act
  - EPA to develop an "efficiency grant program" for small publicly owned water systems or non- profit groups that assist such systems
  - Replacement or repair of equipment that improves water or energy efficiency of small publicly owned treatment works
  - Funding TBD IIJA did not include authorization of appropriations
