Resolution on New CDC Requirements for Dogs Entering the U.S. from Canada

WHEREAS,	the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is implementing the following new requirements for dogs entering the U.S. from abroad; dogs must be at least 6 months of age, have a universally readable microchip, appear healthy upon arrival, and have a CDC Dog Import Form receipt; and
WHEREAS,	these requirements are scheduled to take effect on August 1, 2024; and
WHEREAS,	these requirements were first announced by the CDC on May 8, 2024, less than three months before the proposed implementation date; and
WHEREAS,	this amount of time is not enough to ensure full consultation with Canada and the proper education of travelers; and
WHEREAS,	these requirements are intended to prevent dog-maintained rabies virus variant (DMRVV), also known as dog rabies, from entering the U.S.; and
WHEREAS,	Canada shares the same rabies free status as the U.S. and Canada also has measures in place to address the risk of dog rabies from off-shore; and
WHEREAS,	almost 400,000 individuals cross the northern border every day, many with dogs as family pets, assistance dogs, or military or other security service dogs; and
WHEREAS,	this will be particularly challenging for truck drivers (approximately 25% of Canadian truckers travel with a dog); and
WHEREAS,	individuals who rely on assistance dogs will be adversely affected as the requirements will add unnecessary stress and complications for individuals who depend on their dogs for daily activities; and
WHEREAS,	the CDC form is currently not accessible for those with visual impairments, making it challenging for travelers with service dogs to be able to comply; and

WHEREAS,	a binational and bipartisan group of U.S. Congresspeople, Canadian Members of Parliament, the Canadian Minister of Health, and others have called for an implementation delay or permanent exemption; now therefore be it
RESOLVED,	the MLC requests that the CDC implement an 18-month delay to this rule at the Canadian land borders; and be it further
RESOLVED,	the MLC requests that the CDC consider a permanent exemption of these new requirements for those entering the U.S. from Canada; and be it further
RESOLVED,	that this resolution be submitted to appropriate state, federal and provincial officials.
